Actually it was both Lord and Lady Baden-Powell's **birthday** because they shared the same date!

A few years later, at the 7th **World** Conference, someone said "just thinking out loud here... but don't birthdays usually come with gifts?". Someone suggested that everyone donate a penny to a Thinking Day Fund. The **Brownies** turned out their pockets – their **leaders** had told them to always have a coin on hand for a phone box! ### Friendship knots

#### Resources:

- card (use old cereal boxes)
- scissors
- pencil
- cup (to trace a circle)
- 7 embroidery threads
- tape (helps with set up).

#### Set up of cardboard discs:

- 1) Draw and cut out circles from cardboard (8-10cm)
- 2) Poke a hole (big enough for threads to pass through) in the centre.
- 3) Around the edge of the circle, cut 8 notches evenly spaced.

#### Set up of threads:

- 1) Tie 7 threads together in a knot at one end. You could choose the colours to represent your favourite things about guiding, different parts of the guiding promise, or each of the different sections.
- 2) Put knot through centre of cardboard
- 3) Slot threads into each notch, and should have one empty notch.

#### Braiding:

- 1) Hold empty notch at the top (12 o'clock)
- 2) Count 3 notches clockwise from the empty space, moving that thread to the empty notch.
- 3) Rotate the wheel so the empty notch is at the top again.
- 4) Repeat, 3 clockwise to the empty notch.
- 5) Keep going until it's at the desired length.

#### Finishing:

1) Remove all threads from notches and tie a knot, cutting off excess thread.

#### A letter across the world

#### Step 1:

Decorate your card.

Ideas: use blues and whites (official WAGGGS colours), include guiding symbols such as trefoil/campfires/flags or landmarks from the UK, add World Thinking Day motifs such as hearts and friendship.

#### Step 2:

Write your message.

Ideas: Introduce yourself and your unit, share something from your guiding life (favourite memory/activity), ask questions about their guiding life (special badge/life in other country), World Thinking Day message.

#### Step 3:

Keep or share. Up to units/individuals. You could either keep your letters/postcards. Or choose to send it (physically/virtually) internationally.
