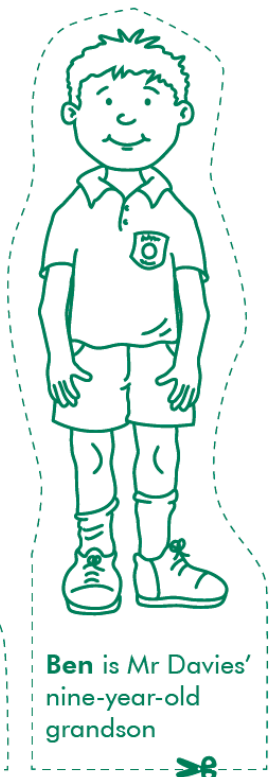
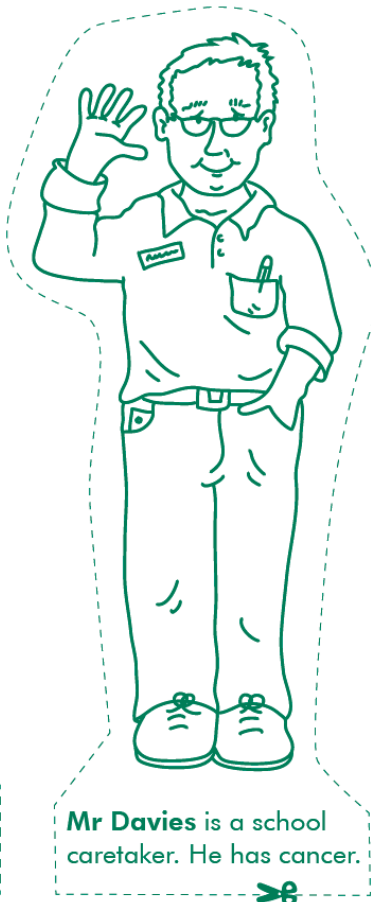
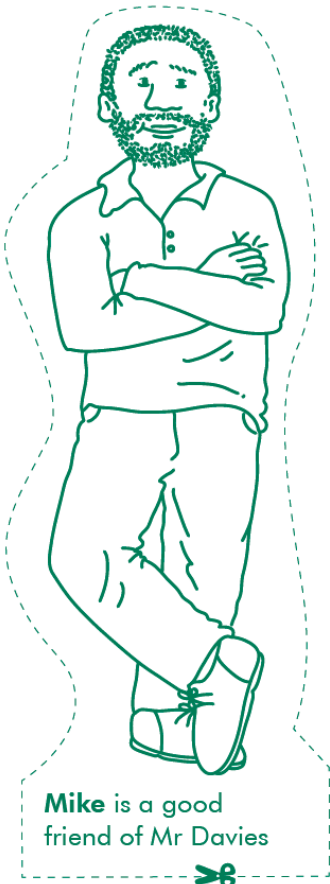


# HAVE YOU GOT THE FACTS ABOUT CANCER?
